1.0 **CALL TO ORDER**

Mr. Tim Manning, Board Chair, called the Meeting to order at 9:00 am. It was established that a quorum of the Board was present. Ms. Donna Nordmann was appointed recording secretary of the Meeting.

3.0 **INDIGENOUS WELCOME**

Knowledge Keeper Shane Pointe commenced the meeting with an Indigenous Welcome.

CHAIR ADDRESS TO THE PUBLIC 4.0

The Chair provided an address to the public. Mr. Manning reflected on the lives and contributions of two beloved leaders who had passed.

Senator Murray Sinclair, Mazina Giizhik of the Anishinaabe people, who was a renowned Manitoba lawyer, judge and leader of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. At PHSA his legacy will help inform our work towards fulfilling our North Star priority of eradicating Indigenous-specific racism and creating a health-care system that is equitable, culturally safe and free from discrimination.

Former BC Premier John Horgan whose leadership paved the way for the 10-year provincial cancer care action plan, which is now transforming care and care outcomes for British Columbians in need. Mr. Manning reported that two PHSA programs – Sanya'kula and BC Emergency Health Services were honoured with a Healthcare Employee Relations Award, presented by the Health Employers Association of British Columbia. The awards recognize human resource and labour relations professional who strive to create workplaces that support delivery of high-quality health care.

Mr. Manning also recognized that a member of the PHSA Executive Leadership Team, Dr. Natasha Prodan-Bhalla, Vice President of Quality, Safety, Clinical Informatics and Chief of Nursing and Allied Health, was named one of this year's recipients of the Nurses and Nurses Practitioners of BC Excellence in Nursing Leadership Award.

Matters for Board Approval

1) PHSA Research and Student Education Consolidated Summary Report FY 2023-24 The PHSA Research and Student Education Consolidated Summary Report is prepared for the PHSA Board of Directors on an annual basis and is reviewed by the Research and Academic Development Committee.

The Framework for PHSA Metrics and the Framework for Student Education Metrics guide the data presented within the report each year. PHSA research and student education activities are enabled by collaboration and partnership among PHSA clinical and research programs and academic and regional health authority partners.

The Report includes:

- Dashboards with quantitative metrics based on PHSA Board- approved performance indicator frameworks
- Narrative that highlights PHSA's academic health science mandate, and the impacts and outcomes being realized in research and student education
- PHSA program sections that identify the Top 3 research accomplishments by research entity (important achievements that may not be well reflected through quantitative metrics), present research and student education infographics (illustrating high level inputs and outputs), and detail research outcomes identified by PHSA research entities
- Examples of important research questions that are being answered through the rich data assets available in PHSA registries

Among the accomplishments highlighted in this year's report are two core metrics: In 2023/24, PHSA researchers were awarded more than \$218 million in external funding, an increase from \$190 million last year. The number of students on placements was 4, 128, an increase from 3, 567 in 2022/23.

Matters for Board Information

1) PHSA Research Outcomes Panel Presentation

The Committee received presentations from the PHSA scientists representing fundamental, clinical, population and health system research. Each demonstrated the reach and benefits of research collaborations lead by PHSA researchers and their teams.

- **Dr. William Gibson, BCCHRI:** Dr. Gibson described a new gene involved in systemic lupus erythematosus (lupus), an autoimmune disorder, that BCCHRI researchers discovered. This discovery enables improved diagnostics and identifies potential treatments for patients and their families affected by Lupus.
- **Dr. Agatha Jassem, BCCDC:** Dr. Jassem described the development and implementation of a new diagnostic test for sexually transmitted and blood borne infections (STBBI). The new method of testing for these infections using a dried blood sample collected from a finger-prick has proven to be accurate and more widely accessible than traditional phlebotomy.
- **Dr. Jehannine (J9) Austin, BCMHSUS:** Dr. Austin shared highly cited research on pharmacogenomic-guided treatment for major depression. The research group demonstrated the clinical benefits and cost-savings of this novel approach to treating this common mental health condition.
- **Dr. Gina Ogilvie, WHRI:** Dr. Ogilvie presented PHSA-led research demonstrating an improved and more accessible approach to screening for cervical cancer. This research lead to new screening policy in January, 2024, the first of its kind in Canada.
- **Dr Christian Steidl, BCCA:** Dr. Steidl and the Centre for Lymphoid Cancer described a new digital gene expression platform to test for lymphomas. This testing led to improved outcomes and quality of life for people living with lymphoma, and socioeconomic benefits to the health system. Uptake of the test in clinical practice continues to expand.

This research represents impressive collaboration and advancement. Together, these five leading scientists offered concrete examples of the many ways that research conducted across PHSA is improving health care and the health system.
