RESEARCH PRIVACY BREACHES

Purpose

This guidance has been developed to provide clarity around considerations and process for Privacy breaches involving research participants in research settings.

Background

Privacy breaches that occur within clinical research settings are connected but distinct from privacy breaches that occur outside research settings. Participation in research is voluntary, this needs to be accounted for in the risk/benefit assessment of any breach. Underscoring the voluntary nature participating in research, participant have usually signed a consent form. Further, consistent across research ethics standards and regulations, researchers have a duty to inform in a timely manner if new information that becomes available that may be relevant to the participants willingness to continue participating.

Assessment

- Is the patient a research participant? Is the incident related to research activities?
- Is the data breach within PHSA or outside of PHSA?
- Any reason not to inform participant?
- Reasons to delay? (ie. Patient special circumstance In-patient status, current distress)

Steps

- 1. Study team to analyse the situation.
- 2. Inform the participant unless justification to do otherwise.
- 3. Report
 - a. To C&W REB in RISe following protocol deviation instructions
 - b. And to PHSA Privacy following the instructions on POD
